INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

External grants, 2017/18

The Police and Crime Plan 2016 - 2020 sets out the Commissioner's police and crime objectives. These include:

- Protecting from harm
- Supporting victims of crime
- Building trust and confidence in our police
- Strengthening communities and growing the economy
- Building a modern police service
- Standing up for young people
- Tackling national and international threats

Since the July 2016 managers within the PCC's office have been developing proposals for funding during 2017/18. These were reviewed as a management team in November 2016 to construct the list of projects detailed in Annex A. A number of these projects have already commenced in 2016/17 and 2017/18 will be the second year of funding. All the projects will assist in the delivery of the Police and Crime Plan.

The proposed projects and schemes will be allocated to lead member of staff in the PCC's office, and, as appropriate, there will be project management and oversight arrangements in place, to include project plans, financial oversight, governance oversight, performance monitoring, outcomes monitoring, communications plans and engagement activity.

Responsibility for delivery is delegated to the Chief Executive in accordance with the Scheme of Joint Governance.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The external spend programme detailed in Annex A is supported by 2017/18 revenue funding and reserves as detailed in the Commissioners Budget for 2017/18.

Expenditure will be compliant with all appropriate requirements and procedures.

Schedule 9 of the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 provides Commissioners with the powers to award crime and disorder grants to any organisations and projects they consider will help them achieve their crime prevention and wider priorities.

Domestic Violence Perpetrator Programme	Force wide trial of interventions to reduce offending by perpetrators of domestic violence. Funding part of a year 2 of programme.	£500,000
Projects from Gangs and Violence Commissioner recommendations	Money for specific projects resulting from recommendations from the Gangs and Violence Commission. Includes schools coordinator post and grant funding post. Post to create external funding opportunities for the West Midlands. Particular projects will include mentors in schools, responding earlier to domestic abuse within Primary Care, intervening in acute health settings and support systems to understand adverse childhood experiences.	£400,000
Violence Prevention Alliance Offender Management	Core costs, admin, project manager, health scientists, admin. Post criminal sanction to assist people into work.	£137,000 £250,000
Reducing offending through employment - Black Country	Prevention project to encourage young people into employment and training.
